2006 marks the 149th year that St. Mary Star of the Sea Parish has served as a beacon of light to those who seek Jesus Christ. It is hard to imagine what things were like here 149 years ago. One thing we do know is that the faith of those who have gone before us built up this great community of faith and made it what it is today. Over these many years we have faced many challenges as a parish community.

I am so grateful to so many of you for all that you do for St. Mary's.

As we begin a New Year I once again ask for your help. We need your support to keep our school alive. Please consider the possibility of offering to a child from St. Mary's Parish the opportunity that each one of us has had, the gift of a Catholic education. Your gift can make the world of difference. May God bless you and all of your families.

The Principal's Report

Dear Friends,

I had the pleasure to spend time with some of you in October at the "Golden Oldie" reunion. What a wonderful celebration! Reunions, especially those of elementary schools, are unique experiences. We are transported back to a time when life was so simple. There is no need to "put on airs." We are with people who knew us before material things mattered, financial status was calculated, or "success" was measured by financial worth.

At the party, I was overwhelmed by the generosity of the guests. The school was presented with a substantial donation from the "50/50 raffle." An extremely generous tuition scholarship was presented in memory of an alumnus. A member of the "Golden Oldie" group sent me a check specifically for the Pre-Kindergarten. Of course, all these gifts have been put to good use. We continue to receive gifts from a few other alumni, as well. I have said this many times: the St. Mary's Alumni are THE BEST!

How is the school doing today? I have told you, in previous newsletters, about the serious financial crisis we are experiencing. This year, enrollment is up slightly. Our current enrollment is 255 students. We are fortunate to be part of two scholarship programs - *Futures in Education* and the *Children's Scholarship Fund*. There are about 25 students who participate in these programs. They would be unable to attend St. Mary's if not for the financial aid they receive. However, our present worry revolves around day-to-day operating expenses. Every few weeks, we receive an oil delivery of more than 1,000 gallons! Do I need to say more?

We are presently meeting with the other schools and parishes in Rockaway to determine the future of Catholic Schools in our area. Are all the schools viable? Can they all continue? These are questions that need to be answered. Of course, we want our school to stay open. We are the only Catholic School in the area. We feel we are needed and necessary, but the financial realities must be considered. I will be happy to share the results of these meetings with you.

I worry about the financial stability of our school. However, when I see the children happy and safe, and I know they are being educated to become productive members of tomorrow's world, I know that we are needed - now, perhaps, more than ever. Please keep us in your prayers. I would love to hear from anyone who has any suggestions regarding our financial situation. I'm sure you have some wonderful ideas - after all, you are St. Mary's graduates! God bless all of you.

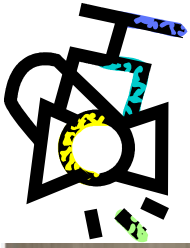

Julia Waldron, Class of '38

On September 24, 2005, St. Mary Star of the Sea Parishioner Julia Waldron was inducted into the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem. The Order has a worldwide mission to support the Holy Places, particularly in Jerusalem, and has approximately eighteen thousand members across the globe. This most impressive honor was bestowed upon Julia by Cardinal Egan at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, where she became a Lady of the Holy Sepulchre.

This is one of the oldest and most distinguished orders of knighthood confirmed upon men and women for leadership in the Church, in the community, and in their individual lives.

Julia is a 1938 alumna of St. Mary Star of the Sea School. She was a founding member of the alumni association to which she continues to contribute her endless time and effort. Other parish responsibilities Julia has held include participation in St. Mary's Pastoral Council, as well as the Diocesan Bishop's Pastoral Council. She is a parish trustee for St. Mary's, as well as a Eucharistic Minister for patients in St. John's Hospital.

Julia is a life long resident of Far Rockaway. She is retired from her position as membership manager for the New York Chamber of Commerce. Julia loves to travel and has traveled throughout Europe, and has made extensive trips to Ireland where she has many cherished family members.

Julia said she was thrilled by receiving this honor. Others were thrilled for her, and know just how well deserved the honor was. Also receiving this special honor was parish member Dr. Emy Punsalan.

Dear Father Cunningham,

Sincere gratitude for St. Mary's Alumni Action News, Winter '05. It is so full of good news. My name is Faine McMullen, R.S.C.J. - but as a student graduate of St. Mary's Class of 1926 I was called Redempta.

I write to acknowledge my gratitude to my first and most precious of schools and to Fr. Farrell, then Pastor, and the Sisters of St. Joseph. With their values and principles I built the foundation of my years of high school, College of Mount St. Vincent and Fordham University School of Law. I received my J.D. in 1937 and was admitted to the NYS Bar in the same year.

After practicing law in N.Y.C. till 1944, I felt the *Call of Our Loving God* to enter the Society of the Sacred Heart, which I did in '44. After profession in 1954, I taught at New College for 20 years. When the College merged with another, I left to serve the poor as legal counselor and political activist until 1985. Then I retired to our Convent in Albany.

This looking back is simply to say what the education at St. Mary's has meant 'thru these nine decades. St. Mary's is a school where sound moral and intellectual values are developed and where the student is given an awareness of the needs of the human family and his/her responsibility to respond to them. In a word - St. Mary's is a **God-given** opportunity for a student's basic education.

May God sustain the School for long years and bless you, the faculty, all the students and Alums, and the thousands of parents and friends who have supported it.

Call to Service

St. Mary's School achieved an enrollment this year of slightly more than 250 students. As many know, we did NOT enjoy any significant boost in enrollment following the closing of St. Joachim's in Cedarhurst. While Fr. Jim has indicated (see page 1) that this number is ok, it's really not enough to fully achieve self-sufficiency, provide the level of service our students deserve (*and the market place demands*), or insulate us against the (now) yearly threat of "school closings." What our alma mater really needs is a solid yearly enrollment of some 300 students.

It's a simple fact that many parish families with school age children, and a strong appreciation of catholic education, simply cannot afford the tuition these days. This is reflected in the high participation rate in the parish CCD program. How can we encourage or facilitate the transition of CCD participants to registered, tuition-paying students?

One word comes to mind: *scholarships*.

For as long as I can remember, the parish has promoted the idea of full or partial scholarships to the children of financially distressed, parish-registered families. In better times, this "ministry" - made possible through the generosity of registered parishioners - was funded from parish revenues. Some alumni have been quietly shouldering this burden, with little or no recognition, for some time now. They - and the school - desperately need our help. Yearly tuition runs in the area of \$ 2,800 these days. For an annual tax-deductible, charitable donation of \$ 3,000, we can provide a quality catholic educational opportunity for a needy parish child, along with a modest uniform allowance - and save the future of catholic education at St. Mary's.

Our Pastor, Fr. Jim, has agreed to identify students of eligible families presently enrolled in the parish CCD program, and our Principal, Angela Brucia, has agreed to administer a scholarship program through which we could be periodically informed of the progress of these students. Anonymity, of course, remains an option. We may wish to dedicate our individual scholarships to the memory of those who sacrificed to provide for our educational needs.

Please contact Fr. Jim or Ms. Brucia if you are interested in participating. Thank you.
